Outrigger Paddles to State Championship

Outrigger paddled to one of its finest seasons ever, winning all six individual regattas, and the Oahu and State Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association championships for 1985.

The Club recorded the most points ever in local competition, going over the century mark in every regatta, and accumulating 187 points in the state championships.

"It was a true team effort," said head coach Henry Ayau. "Every one of our paddlers, from the youngest to the oldest, contributed to this year's victory.

"It takes points in every race to win

a championship, and we got those points from every crew consistently throughout the season," he added.

Outrigger had a truly impressive record this season. Five crews went through the entire season undefeated—the Girl's 13's and 18's, and the men's Freshmen, Sophomore and Seniors. Ten other crews finished first or second in every race—the Girl's 14's, and the women's Novice B, Freshmen, Junior, Senior and Senior Master's crews; the Boy's 14's and the Men's Junior, Novice A and Novice B.

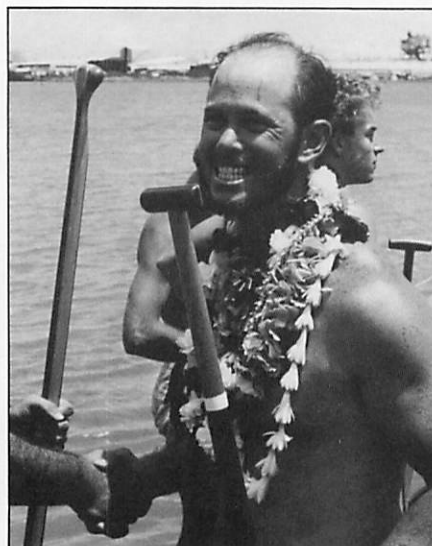

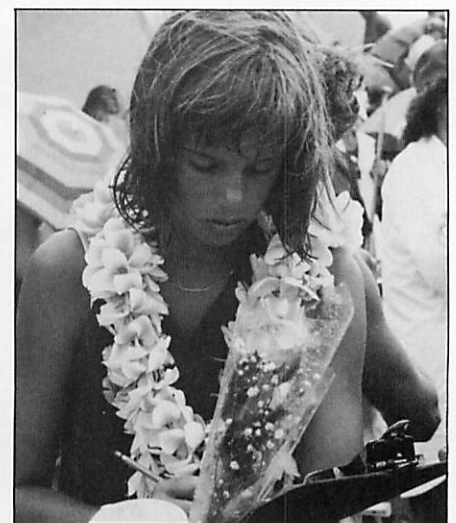

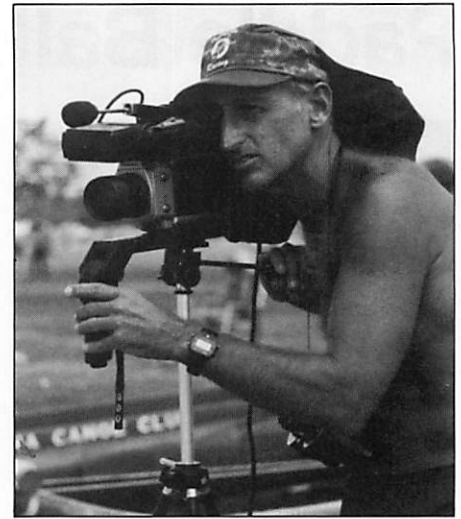

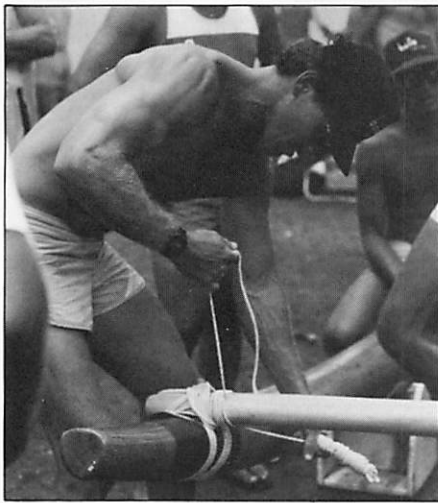

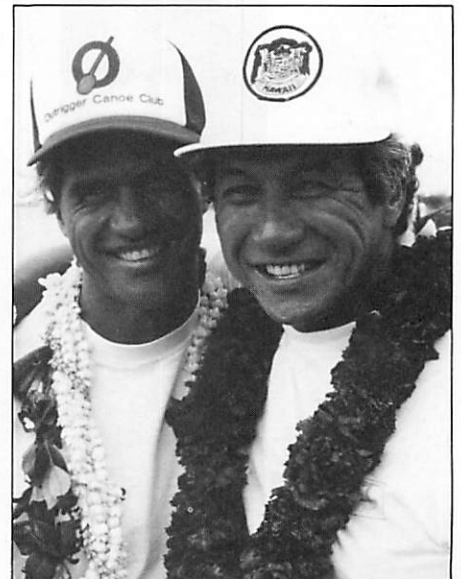

Paddle Ball Goes to Sea



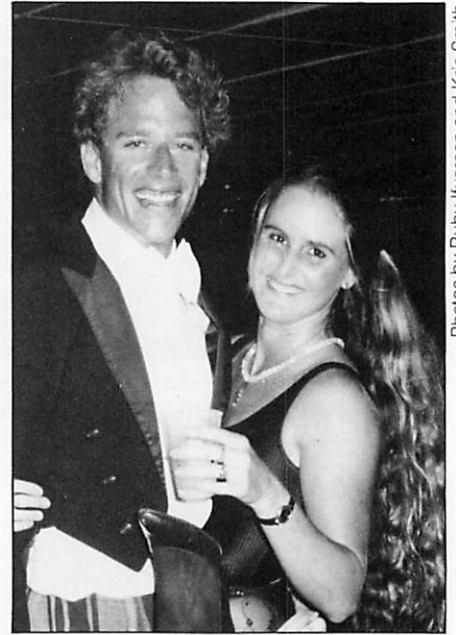

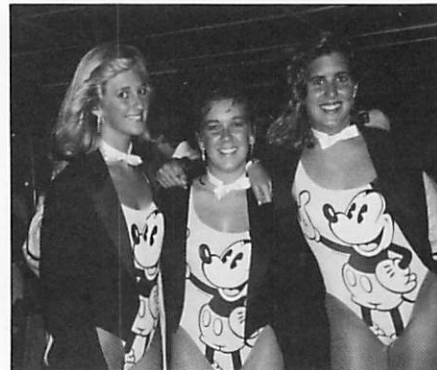

Paddlers Increase the Distance

Long distance paddling moves into full gear this month for both the men's and women's crews.

On Sept. 8, Outrigger will sponsor a new distance race with Kilakila o Hawaii, a canoe club, centered at Pokai Bay. The men's race, open to all clubs, will begin outside the Club at the channel entrance, and end at Pokai Bay, a distance of approximately 31 miles.

When the men's race is finished, iron-women's crew's of six, will paddle six miles, from Pokai Bay to Makaha

and Maile, and return to Pokai Bay.

The Kaena Challenge Race is scheduled for Sept. 15. Men will race from Haleiwa to Pokai Bay. The last time OCC was in this race, its crews finished first and second.

On Sept. 29, the women will compete in the Na Wahine O Ke Kai, the annual race from Molokai to Oahu.

There was once a day when we had two rows of Hobie Cats, do you remember? And Sunfish sailed all day long, their sails catching the sunlight off our OCC shores. Sailing has fallen off since then, and may never attain its former popularity, but the goal of the Sailing Committee is to maintain current interest in the sport, and hopefully guide its growth so that sailing can once more be one of the great, viable athletic activities available at our Club.

Outrigger Foundation Auction Offered Best Bargains in Town

The Outrigger Foundation's first-ever auction on July 29 was a tremendous success, raising more than \$17,000 for Hawaii's athletes, and providing the 130 attendees with an evening of good food, tremendous bargains and great fun.

"I think we accomplished everything we set out to do," said committee chairman Bob Kashare. "Our goal was to raise somewhere between \$15,000 and \$20,000, and we did that.

"We also wanted to invite participation from as many members as possible, invite the public to join with us in our fund-raising effort, and make sure that everyone who came had a good time. From the comments I heard afterward, I think we succeeded on all counts."

Auctioneer Dave Pierson kept the audience entertained for more than two

hours as he auctioned off 104 items. Every single item in the voice auction was sold, and all but two items in the silent auction were sold.

In the regular auction, the greatest bargain was the use of a Maserati for a day, which sold for \$25. The most expensive item sold was Paige Vitousek's Navion single-engine, four-seat airplane which went for \$12,500.

Doug Kilpatrick drove away from the Club in the 1963 yellow Jaguar that was donated by Kiki Rolles for a mere \$3,700.

Joan Ka au'a's beautiful queen-sized Hawaiian quilt was a tremendous bargain for \$950.

The highly publicized uncontested divorce AND the wedding ceremony, not necessarily in that order, went to the same person for bids of \$60 and \$75, respectively. An unadvertised

special—a vasectomy—was bid on by a wife in behalf of her embarrassed husband—for \$100.

Some of the other items in the auction were trips to the Neighbor Islands, the mainland and Tahiti; meals at restaurants in town; cruises, golf, antiques, dental services, jewelry, clothing, canoes, art work, dance lessons, tickets, wine, video rentals, motor oil, a real estate license exam course, a wardrobe consultation, a will and more.

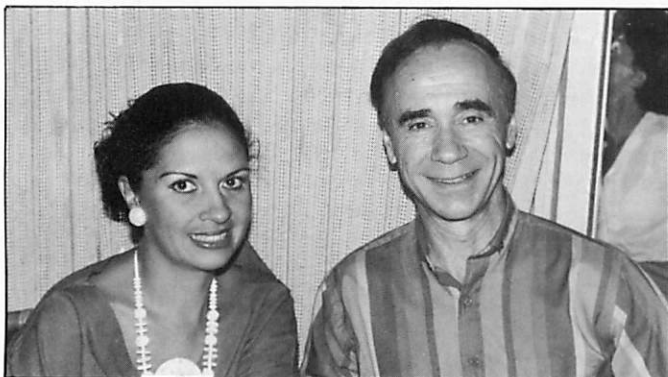

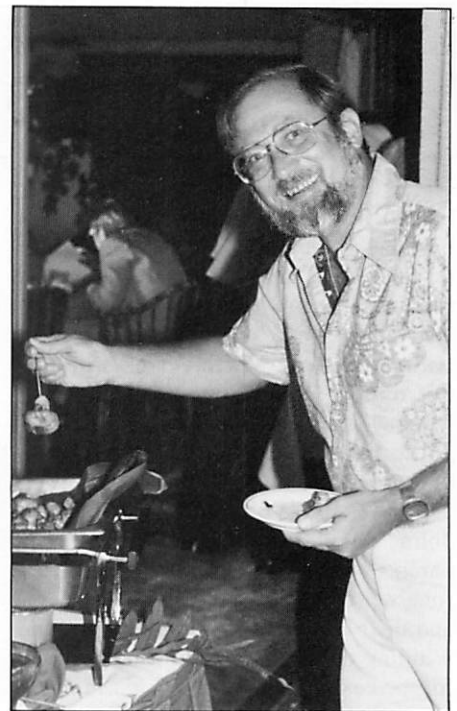

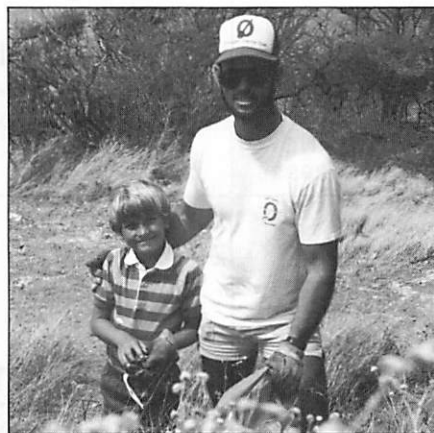

On July 4 at 1 p.m. the Ocean Racing Catamaran Association officially logged the Transpacific departure of Rudy Choy's Aikane X-5 catamaran from California shores.

With four California crew members and four from Honolulu, the cat took off at high speed, and continued thus until becalmed early into the race. In spite of this obstacle, Rudy Choy was pleased with the boat's overall performance.

The Aikane X-5 is the lightest cat he ever built with 62' LOA (length overall), 30' beam, and weighing under 10,000 lbs.

Once the winds returned, Choy estimates the boat led the race 75-80 percent of the time and crossed the finish line at 11:35 p.m. on July 14, just 10 days, 10 hours, and 35 minutes after leaving California. Proudly, the boat flew the Hawaii State flag and our own

Neal Ifversen, Both the Youngest and the Oldest Board Member

What's that? *Both* the youngest *and* the oldest?

That's right. At the time Ifversen was first elected to the Board of Directors back in the 1950s, he was its youngest member. Now, having served a total of 18 years on the Board during the intervening 30 years, he is its oldest member.

An Outrigger member for more than 50 years, Neal has seen the Club enjoy and suffer good times and bad.

"This Club didn't just happen," he says. "A lot of blood, sweat and tears went into making it go. I remember walking the streets in 1940/41 trying to get people to join when it only cost ten dollars. Now it costs five thousand dollars and they're begging to get in."

"The first club was just a grass shack. Then it was torn down to make way for the second one, just a dressing room and an office. We had a tin roof to keep our canoes under. The third club was a regular building, opened on the Fourth of July 1941. Our present location is the fourth building."

"Today's members don't realize nor do they appreciate what has gone before to cause them to have what they have here."

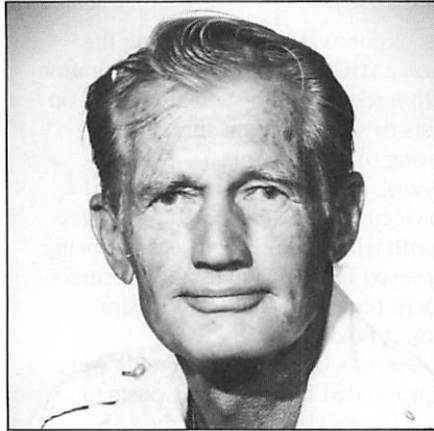
This is typical of the "me" generation. To paraphrase the famous quote which President Kennedy took for his inaugural speech (it came from a poem by Oliver Wendell Holmes) they are interested in what the Club can do for them, *not* what they can do for the Club.

Neal has served on every committee in the Club either as Chairman, a member or as its Coordinating Director.

"I recall," he says, "when the Admissions Committee members names were kept secret; only the Chairman's name was known."

A surfer, a paddler and a volleyball player for the Club in the past, Neal has passed these activities on to his wife and son.

While involved in his regular career in Industrial Relations, Industrial Management and Public Relations (he was one of the founders of HMSA and initiated the plan on all of the outside islands) he managed to serve for 30



years as a member of the Honolulu Police Reserve.

"I used to work my regular job all day and then report every other night for a full shift in the HPD," he says.

His police work was so well regarded that he was promoted to the Detective Division in 1947, the first Police Reserve to be accorded that honor.

"Some of my most interesting and exciting times have been in the police reserves," Neal says. "I've been shot at. Fingerprints I lifted off a stolen car became the key to cracking a tough burglary case."

He staked out the Reef Hotel after a rash of hotel burglaries and spotted the thief who fled but was apprehended by the HPD.

As for Club activities Neal believes "our restaurant should have the very best food in town at low prices. It has no overhead such as rent or taxes or utilities, for example. When commercial restaurants can make money when they DO have these expenses, we certainly should do better."

"Another point, regulations regarding the conduct of members should be tightened up. A few have been getting away with violating them."

"Also, I believe that members should be kept fully informed of what's going on in the Club. A folder should be maintained at the front desk outlining all the Board's decisions and details of its financial operations. Any member should be able to review it any time he wants to do so."

"Another thing, a daily log is

presently maintained of all activities in the Club. This log should be made available to the House Committee in order to assist it in making recommendations for improvement in Club operations.

"I used to know everyone in the Club," says Neal. "Now the membership's so large that it's impossible, but I do think that every effort should be made to keep all members informed of what's going on. Even so, this is the best Club in the world. I am proud to be a member and glad to have contributed to the best of my ability to help make the Outrigger what it is today."

Board Briefs

By Gerri Pedesky

Treasurer's Report: Net income for June was \$12,603 less than June 1984. Year-to-date was \$25,364 higher than last year. Clubhouse Operations was \$10,733 less than last year but \$6,560 better than budget. Snack Shop net income was \$2,157 better than last June. Sales were \$20,925 which was \$6,513 better than any other month in 1985. Total Members' Equity as of June 30, 1985 was \$4,198,023.

Manager's Report: Food and Beverage Departments combined produced a net bottom line of \$37,982. (3.3%) year-to-date on gross sales of \$1,149,786. Unrelated or nonmember income generated through June 30, 1985 was 1.4% (on an adjusted gross income base of \$2,352,759) compared to same period in 1984 of 1.6%. On the 4th of July 364 steak fry dinners and 108 spaghetti dinners were sold with bar sales an outstanding \$10,091.

Building and Grounds: On going

discussion was held concerning the garage structural integrity investigation with a request for a second opinion on costs of slab elevation survey and testing of core samples. . . . **House Report:** Additional part time guard service is being considered on a three month trial basis. Employees are being surveyed for their input on uniforms. Board requested that Club Roster project be dropped.

Athletics/Winged "O": Funds were appropriated to help defray costs to send Heath Hemmings to the U.S. Surfing Championships and National Scholastic Surfing Championships in California. Funds were approved for

purchase of canopy for small whaler, canvas racing cover for new racing canoe and "blue cocoon" canvas cover for transporting and storage of canoe.

Public Relations: Committee's budget was increased to accommodate 100 additional copies of *The Outrigger* each month. Funds were approved to cover production and costs of recording Alex Anderson's Club song. Board approved the establishment of a permanent Community Relations subcommittee which would be in charge of such events as the Honolulu Marathon Aid Station, Carole Kai Bed Race, Community Cleanup Campaign, etc.

The Committee is presently working on plans to merge with the Duke Kahanamoku Foundation, a foundation with similar goals.

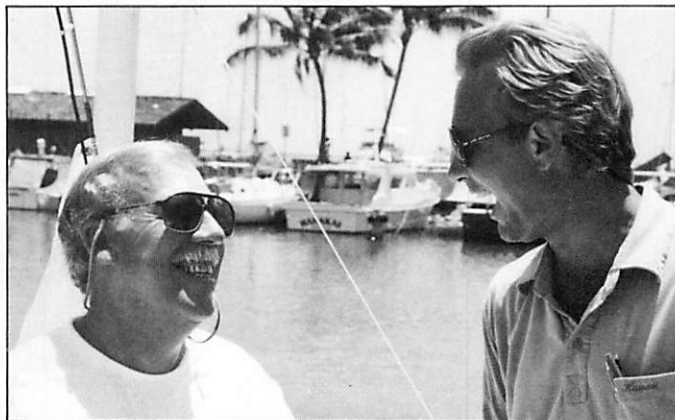
