

Coaching Workshop

Dual-goal coaching emphasizes the physical and emotional development of all athletes by; re-defining winning, honoring the game, and filling the emotional tank. The motto of the PCA is to *transform youth sports*, so sports can transform youth. We encourage every junior coach to participate in these PCA workshops.

Paddling Registration

Canoe Vandalism

Minor vandalism to one training canoe and theft of a set of *iako* and *ama* occurred at the Ala Wai site in late February. The incident was reported to HPD. Apparently other canoe clubs are experiencing an increase in these incidents. The Canoe Racing Subcommittee will address the off-season storage of training canoes.

Boat Lockers





Kō Kainalu Program

All Jr. 'Riggers ages 12-18 are invited to apply for the Kō Kainalu program, brought to you by the OCC Beach and Water Safety Committee. The program is intended for youth members who want to develop and enhance their ocean-related skills.

Successful graduates will follow the tradition of a long line of Outrigger Canoe Club members who symbolize the essence of the waterman/woman including Duke Kahanamoku.

The course format is similar to the City's junior lifeguard program offering a challenging curriculum of classroom lessons and active physical skill development. OCC Beach Services staff will be assisted by guest instructors.

Participants must be competent ocean swimmers and will participate in vigorous physical activities daily.

The program will be held June 7 to 12 from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. each day. The deadline for applications is May 15.

OCC Beach Services personnel will conduct the swim test, for those interested in applying for the program. Participants must be able to swim 250 meters in the Kaimana Channel, to the windsock and back, in less than nine minutes. To take the test, ask beach service personnel at the Beach Desk. The swim test must be completed prior to May 15.

Cost for the program is \$100 per student and includes a surf shirt, shorts, hat and certificate. Students are responsible for their own meals and equipment. They must have a swimsuit, fins, mask and snorkel, and wetsuit top (optional). Surfboard, or other personal water sports equipment is optional.

Students must attend every class session to receive certification.

The schedule will be as follows:

Monday, June 7: CPR, First Aid, OCC Ocean Sports History, and Character Development

Tuesday, June 8: Weather forecasting, reef structures, Diving and snorkeling

Wednesday, June 9: Sailing craft and small boat handling, canoe sailing

Thursday, June 10: Coastal Processes. Hazard and risk ID Jet Ski rescue. Fire rescue

Friday, June 11: Outrigger Canoes, Canoe Surfing Saturday, June 12: Canoe steering clinic and awards ceremony

Field trips are planned to the City & County Lifeguards, Fire Rescue, University of Hawaii Department of Oceanography and Sea Grant Office, and Sea Engineering.

Chief instructor for the program is Don Isaccs. Other instructors are Ricky Grigg, reef structure and wave forecasting; Guy Pere, jet ski operation and rescue techniques; Rob Farrow, character development and life skills; Dean Stowell, diving theory and practice; Don Issacs, First Aid, CPR, nautical skills and sailing; Dolan Eversole, environ-

mental awareness and coastal processes; Courtney Seto, fire search and rescue techniques; Brian Keaulana, hazard and risk ID; Walter Guild, canoe paddling history, tradition and modern practice; and Fred Hemmings, canoe surfing.

Enrollment in the program is limited. Applicants must pass the swimming test, answer three questions and provide a short essay (250 word) on why they want to be in the Kō Kainalu program. Also required is a copy the applicant's report card with current GPA.

Selection criteria will be based on meeting above minimums and a submitting a questionnaire outlining qualifications and experience. A personal introductory letter is required for consideration including background, achievements and personal goals.

The Junior Waterman special committee and B&WS committee will review applications and select applicants.







Member of the U.S. Olympic Team (K-1, K-2, K-4) for the years 1988, 1992, and 1996. Member of the U.S. National Kayak Team from 1986-1996.

Twice selected as the top kayaker in the U.S. The World Championships from 1986-1996 (except Olympic years). And gold and silver medals in K-1 and K-2 at the 1995 Pan-American Games.

And it all started right here at the Club, she insists, from "little kid days" with surfing lessons at Tongg's from Charlie Amalu and Bill Capp. She grew up at the Club loving ocean sports.

She giggles at the memory of Bill Capp buying her first surfboard - an 8 foot tanker when she was about 9 years old. She went on to compete in and win numerous OCC, Ala Moana, Queen's, Chun's Reef, and Haleiwa junior and open surfing meets.

As fellow Winged "O", Kisi Haine, recalls, "Trace was an awesome surfer, awesome athlete. Everything she did, she did great. But when I think back to those days, I just remember a big white lip."


Having no siblings, she grew up thinking of the Haine, Rigg, Balding and McGee kids as her brothers and sisters. "I was pretty much a loner, Kisi was my sister, and we all surfed and played beach volleyball at the Club. I think I played volleyball tournaments with every Rigg except Doug and Lisa."

Growing up around such gifted athletes at Outrigger, Traci felt like they all pushed each other to a point where they were always getting better, no matter what sport they did.

When she started outrigger paddling, there were no age group categories. Novice was the entry level crew. She got steering lessons from none but the best, Fred Hemmings and Tommy Conner. And the list of sprint and distance competitions Traci raced on behalf of the Club is

for the most part long and golden.

She eventually began sharing her technical knowledge, coaching junior crews but her favorite coaching experience was the 1997 Mens Novice A crew (Andrew Nichols, James Triplett, Chris Laird, Keith Cockett, Rob Farrow, Paki Vaughan).

She worked with that crew, watched them steadily improve with every regatta, and at the Oahu's at Keehi that year, watched them win a close race with a strong time of 7:03.06, right there in lane 1. "Then they had the worst race at States! Junk lane, wrong flag!! But still, it's one of my proudest athletic moments," she giggled.

Outrigger has been and always will be her home. It was where she grew up, and where family and friends are. And all in her ohana would aver there is no one who performs with more heart, and who achieved so much through sheer mental determination.

The helium-filled squeak in her voice is gone, overtaken by sincere probity. "At Outrigger, there's so much excellence around you, you have no choice but to be better, and to strive for that same excellence."

Three Elected to Life Membership

Roy C. Kesner Jr.


Under Rab's leadership, there were improvements in the Food and Beverage operations, new uniforms for F&B staff, the old OCC china was



Board Briefs

Board Briefs is taken from the minutes of the March 25, 2004 Board of Directors meeting.

General Manager's Report: There was a net income of \$57,134 for February, which is \$45,334 better than budget. Year to date there was net operating fund income of \$113,069, which is \$85,069 better than budget. The combined food and beverage income with the mini charge was \$9.372.

The shoring of the volleyball structure is underway with shoring supports planned for the underside of the court located in the Snack Shop and the men's and women's locker rooms. The shoring support is required to support the additional weight of the sand as it is pushed to one side of the court so that the cleared side can be waterproofed.

Based on the current analysis completed by the structural engineer, the shoring supports are required to be more extensive than originally anticipated. It was explained the original price quote obtained by the former Maintenance Manager was based on a visual inspection of the structure and now that the as-built drawings have been reviewed and structural calculations have been completed it has been determined that more extensive shoring is required.

Furthermore the structural engineer is now of the opinion that the current structure is under designed based on current building code standards and needs additional permanent supports to keep it from deflecting further. The final design and cost for the permanent supports has not yet been completed.

Admissions & Membership Report: The membership count was 4,678 as of February 29, 2004. . The Board approved Al Serafin, Chair, of the 2004-2005 A&M Committee; and Marc Haine, Bill Bright, Kimo Austin, Gloria Keller, David Buck, Ann Martin, Chris Smith, and Ka'ili Chun as members. . . The Board directed that the Admissions

and Membership Chair begin processing Regular and Intermediate applicants to meet the Key Metrics as stated in the Long Range Plan.

B&G Report: The Board approved Mike Cote, Chair, Building and Grounds Committee; and members John Goody, Ray Cain, Kathy Merrill, John Keoni Kino, Nancy Peacock, Donald Fowler, and Robert Moore.

House Report: The Board approved Glenn Perry, Chair, House Committee; and members Valerie Davis, Peggy Hogan, Gay Sevier, Vicki Reisner, Dale Hope, Bruce Liebert, Mike Paulin, Ron Higgins, and Alan Cambra.

Finance Report: The Board approved Bradley Totherow, Chair, Finance Committee; and members Peter Ehrman, Ken Stehouwer, Joanie Shibuya, Ed Van Lier Ribbink, Gregg Robertson, and Hal Henderson.

Long Range Planning Report: The Board approved Bob Dewitz, Chair, LRP Committee; and members Gordon Smith, Management, Keith Steiner, Chuck McCrary, Susan Merrill, Blair Norris, and Gary Sallee.

Athletic Report: The Board approved a proposal which would feature OCC paddlers modeling Lily designs in a Kathy Muller Agency photo shoot. Lily would donate approximately \$5,000 to the Canoe Racing Subcommittee Special Fund. The Board stipulated that the photography may not be conducted on Club premises; however, an OCC canoe may be used. OCC must have the right to approve copy.

Elks Club Adhoc Committee: the Board approved the rotation of the Elk's Adhoc Committee Chair from Peter Nottage to Bob Dewitz. The Elk's Adhoc Committee will report directly to the Executive Committee. The Committee consists of Bob Dewitz, Jason Oliver, Keith Steiner, Larry Johnson, J.D. Watumull, and William Swope. Peter Nottage resigned from the committee.
